Hunting Armed Robber

Queens detectives are seeking help from the public to identify and locate an armed robber who held up a Maspeth grocery store on November 6.

Police said the suspect entered the Grand Avenue store at about 10 p.m. brandishing a handgun and threatened a clerk firing one round into a wall before grabbing an undisclosed amount of cash from a register and fleeing the scene.

The suspect was wearing black clothes and gloves and a black ski mask at the time of the robbery. The store clerk was not injured in the incident, police said.

Police Nab Purse-Snatcher

Police at the 109th Precinct arrested a 21-year-old Flushing man on November 4 just hours after he allegedly robbed and assaulted a local woman.

The victim, a 22-year-old female, was walking near 157th Street and 35th Avenue at about 12:30 a.m. when the perpetrator, Jose Ruiz, grabbed her purse, knocking her to the ground.

She was treated and released at a local hospital for an ankle injury she suffered

during the attack, police said.

Detectives at the Union Street police precinct canvassed the area following the robbery and tracked Ruiz to his residence on 35th Avenue, based on victim and eyewitness descriptions, police sources said.

Ruiz was arrested on robbery and assault charges at about 10:50 p.m. as he walked along 157th Street near 35th Avenue.

Knife-Tossing Hubby Busted

Police arrested a 42-year-old Oakland Gardens man on November 7 after he threw a steak knife and a plate of food at his wife during an argument at their 226th Street home.

According to the police, Antonio Timpa allegedly tossed the knife at his 41-year-old wife while the couple's 2-year-old daughter was sitting nearby. He also threatened to kill her if she called police, authorities said.

Timpa was charged with attempted assault, endangering the welfare of a child, menacing and harassment.

Sketch Of Dentist-Killer Released

Police officials last week released a sketch of a suspect that can be viewed at the NYPD Web site. They announced a \$41,000 reward on October 28 for the murder of a Forest Hills dentist.

Police sources said the sketch was based on witness descriptions of the man who gunned down Daniel Malakov, 34, in front of his 4-year-old daughter at the Annandale Playground. Malakov, who had been awarded custody of the girl on October 3 after a lengthy court battle with his wife, was at the playground to hand over his daughter to Dr. Mazoltuv (Marina) Borukhova, his ex-wife, for a visit.

The suspect was described as a white male, 48 to 53 years old, with salt-and-pepper hair, 5-foot-8 to 5-foot-9 inches tall, with a stocky build.

the legislation within the next few weeks on

Monday, November 12. Meanwhile, New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg at a separate news conference Monday sounded amenable to the idea of cutting out or at least making their food supply smaller.

Many animal welfare groups support pigeon control because of the theory that overpopulation is unfair and cruel. One such group, the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA), issued a statement supporting Felder's proposal.

"As an advocate for all animals, with a special interest in the animals located in our own city, we support this provision for a variety of reasons," the society declared. "The pigeon population is well known amongst New Yorkers and not usually very well received. Therefore, while we appreciate these creatures as part of our regional landscape, we also acknowledge that it is important to maintain their population so that they do not impede the health and sanctity of our city.

"By nature, pigeons are extremely resourceful cliff-dwelling birds, who are particularly adept at securing nesting places among the many high-rises and bridges throughout the five boroughs. This hardy constitution enables the birds to breed prolifically. As such, New York has become the home to an astronomical number of these creatures.

"In order to curb the extensive pigeon population, the city has adopted a number of solutions to maintain a healthy environment. Key among these provisions is the issuing of summonses to those found feeding the pigeons in violation of Health Code regulations. Providing food for pigeons not only causes an influx of birds to the area, but can also attract unwanted rodents and insects as well, thereby contaminating an area in a very short amount of time.

"Councilman Felder's proposal is one that will ensure the pigeons will not be encouraged to reproduce by otherwise well-meaning citizens. We hope to work directly with the councilman in order to ensure that the animals and people of New York City are treated with the respect and dignity they so deserve."

first mortgagee status to the Community Preservation Corporation and became a secondary one. After running through a list of increases in the past 15 or so years, she speculated that it might be indicative of an operational takeover by CPC as the entire mortgagee and the privatization of Big Six. Jacobowitz also cited past increases from 1992 to January 2006, which she called the "ancillaries". She was critical of what she saw as the privileged status of a nursery school in one of the buildings: it takes up 14 rooms, she said, and is charged less than \$200 per month. During this past summer, she further alleged, it was even relieved of that low amount when the rent was waived. Another resident, William Boudreau, said there is too much of the economically strong part of Big Six carrying the weak part. He said that the housing part should be separated from the commercial part, i.e., the strip mall on Queens Boulevard, which has its steady tenants (a supermarket, a dry cleaner, a bank branch) but also empty spots, some of them quite large, that, in his opinion, will probably never be filled again. The mall should be responsible for its own expenses, not subsidized, he said. Another resident, Angel Negron, who recently moved into Big Six but is of retirement age, said that the coop's board of directors is often denounced for acceding to all of management's revenue enhancement requests but is always reelected.

After hearing these persons and others, Slomin said that he would keep the record open to further commentary until November 26, the Monday after Thanksgiving.

who strongly supported the measure, said it marked a significant step forward toward ensuring equal rights for all Americans.

But, Crowley added, more work remains to provide these same protections for gender identity.

GENNARO FILES THREE STORMWATER REDUCTION BILLS:

Trying to kill two birds with one stone, City Councilmember James Gennaro (D-Fresh Meadows), chairman of the council Environmental Protection Committee, introduced three bills last week to reduce the stormwater runoff that carries raw sewage into New York Harbor while also reducing street flooding during heavy rains. Earlier this year, the inability of sewer systems in his district to contain flooding from heavy rains had caused damage from flooding to many homes in his district.

"This progressive legislation will improve the city's water quality, allowing for expanded recreational use of our water, add new green spaces, mitigate flooding, and add capacity to a sewer system that, frankly, is in dire need of help," Gennaro stated.
